

As I am writing this, we are in the week before leaving for the mission trip to Big Creek Missions. So this is a week of preparation and anticipation. This year, both Lucy and I are going, so we have to be sure things are good at home. We have a great friend who will take care of our dog and look after things, but we want it to be easy for her.

Lucy and I will both be on the trip but doing different kinds of work. She will serve in the “community ministry” area. Those groups will have a great variety of interactions with people. They may do yard work, serve meals, work in the food pantry, visit people at nursing homes, or other community outreach to those in need. She will need to be prepared with different types of clothing, and mentally and spiritually ready to interact with many people.

My work will be in construction, likely building an accessibility ramp, repairing a rotted floor, or installing a metal roof. I like this work on mission trips because it is a good change of pace from my everyday work. I will probably take some of my own tools, but I also hope to be a guide/mentor for those who are younger than I am. I also like the opportunity to visit with the people we are serving. I like to learn about them and hear about their faith and their stories.

The trip gets more exciting as I think about it! From making new friends from other parts of the country and the Big Creek area to meeting homeowners and possibly introducing them to Jesus, as well as getting to know our Shiloh mission team better. Every time I go, there is something refreshing that happens, especially as I see young

people gain a greater understanding of life in this world, as well as Spiritual growth and a heart for others that doesn’t happen in our day-to-day activities.

By the time you read this, we will either be on our way, working in Kentucky, or back in Cass County. No matter where we are, there are things you can pray for us. The most obvious is safe travel. We have several vehicles going, so there is always the possibility of mechanical issues. Every day we will be traveling to our ministry sites on unfamiliar roads. Please also pray for our good health, so we will all be able to take part in the mission we are on. Pray for the parents of the kids who are going. I am thankful for their trust and confidence in the adults who are watching over them for the week.



Most of all, pray for the new relationships that are formed. Weeks like this often create unexpected friendships. My prayer is that those friendships will create opportunities for gospel conversations. There may be a time during the trip when we need to be ready with an

answer about *why* we are doing what we are doing. The answers to these questions and the gospel conversations are the reason to continue to pray after the trip. From Cass County, Indiana, we may never know the fruit of a seed planted by a willing young missionary in Hyden, Kentucky. Pray also that we continue the willingness to serve back home in Indiana.

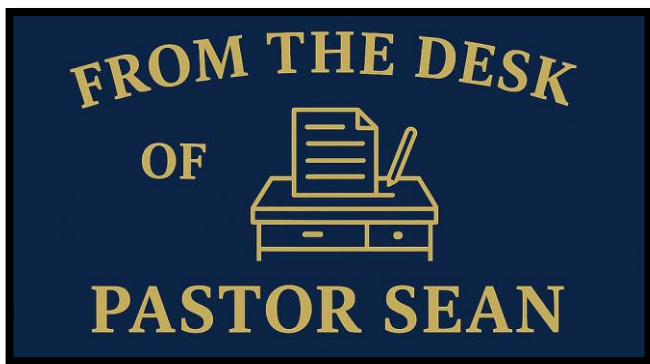

This month, I want to share something exciting happening at Shiloh on August 29th. For many years Shiloh has hosted its own Vacation Bible School. Sometimes it is the full week, sometimes it is a couple of days, and the last few years it has been a weekend. This year, after meeting with the VBS Committee, we decided that instead of a Vacation Bible School, Shiloh is going to host a one-day Carnival outside.

As the team began planning, the vision grew into something that feels fresh for our church and welcoming for our community. On August 29th from 1-6 p.m. we will be hosting the Shiloh Family Funfest. The church grounds will be set up with several themed areas that families can enjoy throughout the day. One of these areas will be Carnival Games Row. This section will include familiar favorites such as ring toss, beanbag toss, bottle knockdown, bowling, a rubber duck pond, and more.

Families can also explore Creative Corner. Children will be able to enjoy face painting and help create a large sidewalk chalk mural. One of the highlights of the day will be our signature attraction, but those plans are still being finalized. We'll share more details in a future announcement.

Since this event is taking the place of VBS for this year, we also want it to reflect the heart of Shiloh. We will have a Welcome Tent with friendly volunteers greeting families as they arrive. There will be a Prayer and Care Tent for anyone who would like someone to talk with or pray with. We will also have a Kids and Youth Ministry Information Table for families who want to learn more about our ministries. We will be giving out a small bag of goodies that includes an invite card with our service times and ministry information.

To finish the day with something fun, we will end the carnival with Pie the Pastor. For one dollar, people will receive two plates filled with whipped cream. This activity will take place during the final hour of the event and is sure to create plenty of laughter.

Outreach Ministry Team

As part of Shiloh's Outreach Ministry, the ministry team felt led to support the Women at the Well Recovery Center in Logansport, Indiana. The center provides certified peer recovery coaching and essential resources to help women on their journey toward healing, personal growth, and lasting recovery as they transition back into society. It offers a safe, stable, and structured Christian living environment where women are encouraged and supported as they work to restore relationships, rebuild their physical and emotional health, and renew their spiritual relationship with Jesus Christ.

The recovery center is located at 1207 N. 3rd Street in Logansport and has the capacity to house up to eight women. One resident serves in a leadership role as the house manager, helping oversee daily activities and offering encouragement to the other women until she is ready to transition into independent living. This position requires specialized training, leadership, and a sincere desire to help others succeed in their personal recovery journeys.

As part of the responsibilities of living at the center, each resident is expected to maintain full-time employment, complete household duties, and contribute toward weekly living expenses. These responsibilities help foster accountability, self-discipline, personal growth, and preparation for independent living. Residents are also encouraged to respect one another's privacy and space, build healthy relationships, and support each other through encouragement, accountability, and compassion as they continue their personal recovery journeys.

Earlier this month, four members of the ministry team toured the facility and met with several of the women currently living in the home, along with one Women at the Well board member. The interior of the house has been beautifully remodeled and modestly furnished through generous donations and grants. While there are still repairs and improvements needed, those involved with the program trust that those needs will be met in the Lord's timing.

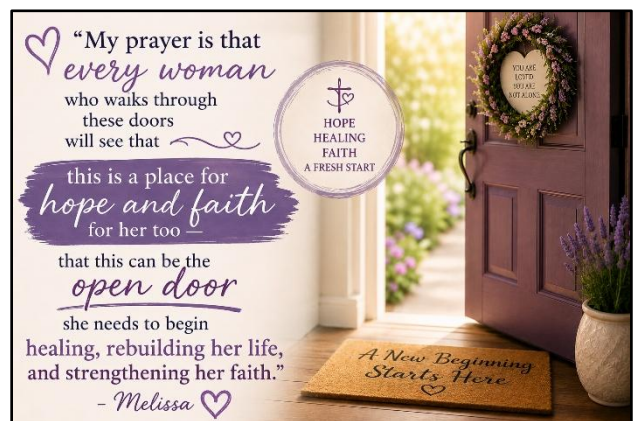
During a follow-up visit, I had the opportunity to talk one-on-one with Melissa, who shared the following about her experience:

This house is both a blessing and milestone in my life. After spending four years in prison, I learned just how difficult it can be to rebuild your life once you return to society. There is a stigma that follows you. People see your past before they see you as a person. In my case, I had sold drugs, and many viewed me as someone who had harmed society and would never change. Carrying that judgment was painful, especially knowing the hurt I had also caused my family.

Trying to start over was overwhelming. Finding a job, securing a place to live, and simply getting back on my feet felt almost impossible. Many people look at someone with a criminal background as a menace to society instead of someone trying to rebuild their life. During that time, I struggled deeply with forgiveness. I believed in God, but I had pushed Him aside because I could not understand how He could still love or forgive me when I could not even forgive myself.

While I was in prison, I began attending church more regularly, reading the Bible, and working on myself. I found comfort in worship and started growing in my faith again. But even after serving my time, the challenges did not disappear. Reentering society came with tremendous stress. I left prison without important documents, without savings, without a job, and without a place to live. I could have stayed with family, but I did not want to place additional burdens on them, especially with my father already facing serious health problems.

There were also financial obstacles waiting for me. I am still working to restore my driver's license, pay off fines, and cover the weekly costs of electronic monitoring. Even insurance costs are higher because of my past. These are struggles many people do not realize individuals face after incarceration.





Outreach Ministry Team
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Coming here was not simply receiving help — it was truly a blessing from God. While I was in prison, I prayed constantly, asking God to guide me and help me see the doors He was opening, because I was losing hope. Slowly, He began revealing small blessings that eventually led to bigger miracles. Being granted work release, receiving modifications through the court, connecting with Michael and Veronica, and finally arriving here were all part of God opening doors at exactly the right time.

The world can be a difficult and overwhelming place, especially for someone walking the road of recovery. In moments of fear, stress, or uncertainty, having a safe and supportive environment is vital to help prevent a return to harmful habits and destructive choices. This home provides that place of refuge — offering encouragement, accountability, compassion, and the opportunity for a renewed beginning.

This home is far more than just a house. It is a blessing from God and a place filled with hope, faith, healing, and the promise of a fresh start. “My prayer is that every woman who walks through these doors will see that this is a place for hope and faith for her too — that this can be the open door she needs to begin healing, rebuilding her life, and strengthening her faith.”

Melissa shared she cherishes this Bible verse: “God is within her, she will not fall; God will help her at break of day. – Psalm 46:5”

Many people do not realize that when someone is released from prison, their financial obligations do not simply disappear. Debts continue to accumulate, and new expenses are often added immediately upon release. For example, individuals on house arrest may be required to pay approximately \$120 each week for electronic monitoring. If driver’s licenses expired while incarcerated, additional fees and fines are often required for reinstatement.

In addition, having felony charges on a record can create significant barriers to employment, housing, and transportation. Many occupations and employers are unwilling or unable to hire individuals with a criminal background, making it difficult to secure stable, well-paying employment. Finding affordable housing can also be a major challenge.

These obstacles create tremendous financial and emotional stress for individuals trying to rebuild their lives. Without reliable transportation, steady employment, or affordable housing, many can feel trapped in a difficult cycle that is hard to overcome without support, encouragement, and opportunities for a fresh start.

The women we met that day left a lasting impression on my heart. Each woman has walked a unique and difficult journey — experiences far different from what many of us may ever face. Yet despite the hardships and failures of their past, each one expressed a sincere desire to move forward, overcome those struggles, and refuse to let past mistakes define who they are today. Instead, they are striving to turn their failures into opportunities for growth, healing, and restoration.

The ministry team purchased a gas grill & bottle, 2 BBQ aprons, and BBQ utensils for the center. As a church family and community, it is important that we continue to pray for the Women at the Well and their families as they rebuild their lives. They need encouragement, opportunities for employment, and people willing to believe in their potential. Most importantly, they need to be welcomed not only as productive members of our community, but also as sisters in Christ who love the Lord and are seeking a new beginning through faith, hope, and recovery.

A Pledge, a Power Walk, and a Picture...A Letter from Lucy

A few weeks ago, I did something different from my normal Saturday routine. I went to Huston Park and walked, raising money for the mobile unit that is available to share ultrasounds with expectant mothers. But let me back up and explain why I was there.

The previous Sunday, Mark had shared information about the walk with the congregation at church. It was a fundraiser to support the Living Alternatives Pregnancy Resource Center Mobile Clinic. This clinic is open the first Monday of each month. The walk was coming up quickly since it was the very next Saturday. I felt the Holy Spirit nudging me to sign up to walk. It was a simple thing that I could do. But raise funds in a week? That was a different story. But I decided to step out in faith and put down that my goal was \$500.

I didn't have time to go door to door to all the people in the church. So I did the next best thing. I asked a few close friends to support me. I put a plea out on Facebook on my own page and on the Shiloh page. And by Friday, believe it or not, I had almost reached my goal. I contacted a few others from our church, sharing how close I was to the goal, and everyone I asked, gave! \$500! Maybe that doesn't seem like much to some people. But it meant the world to me! Then I thought about how many others might have given if I had been able to fundraise a lot sooner than one week before the event!

Saturday came, and I was the only walker there from Shiloh. I signed in, and I walked. It was just that simple. And yet, \$500 was raised to support the mobile clinic, sharing ultrasounds with expectant mothers!

Why is this a big deal? Well, the abortion industry doesn't want women to see their pre-born babies. Seeing a baby in utero makes it very difficult to continue calling it "just a blob of tissue." Seeing the baby makes it real. Many women who might have been considering abortion change their minds after seeing ultrasounds of their babies. And all the money raised that Saturday went to that clinic to save babies! It was a very tangible way to say I did something more than pray for the babies. It was putting feet to my prayers for them.

If anyone has been trying to figure out a way to help promote life for babies in the womb, this is a great way to do it. I can attend all the dinners for Right to Life. I can listen to the speakers share their stories. And I can give my resources to help. But this felt different to me because I felt like I was really doing something to help those babies and their mothers. And I am hoping that by writing about this, that next year, I won't be the only one from Shiloh walking for life. I will be praying that we will have a team of walkers, that we will raise way more than \$500, and that more babies will be saved!

"What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace, be warmed and filled,' without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? 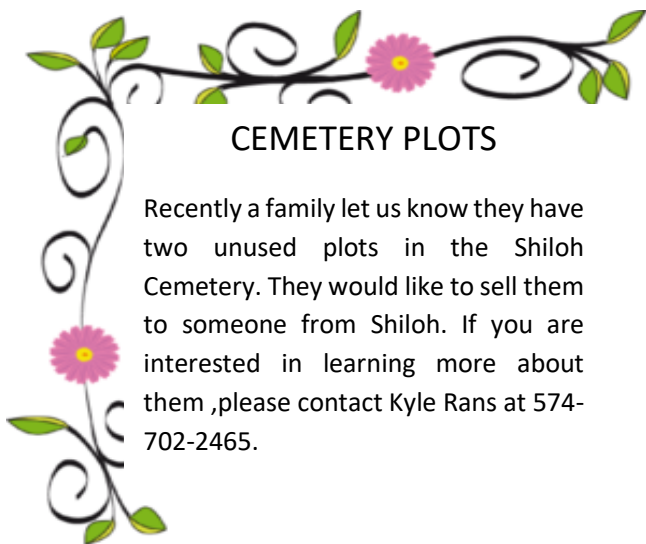
